

LONG THANH—Bob Hope, who has played Santa Claus to U.S. servicemen since 1941, brought his quips, golf club and a star-studded cast to 9th Division headquarters here for a glittering Christmas afternoon performance.

An estimated crowd of 10,000 flocked to the new Special Services stage area, although the exact show time was not announced until Christmas morning.

The hour and a half show, in typical Hope fashion had no dull moments, as the ski-nosed comedy star ad-libbed his way from Elaine Dunn to Miss World to Raquel Welch to Phil Crosby to Barbara McNair to Les Brown and his Band of Renown.

Miss Welch, a prominent cover girl of late, attracted attention in her brief knit mini dress and also surprised the audience with her singing and dancing talents.

After SP4 Joe Martin, a 9th Division radio correspondent from Atlanta, GA, welcomed the

troupe to Bearcat, Hope drew his first laughs by commenting:

"You know, this is a great camp as long as you don't want anything—because everything's either frozen, dehydrated or off limits."

Hope also observed that "the country's kind of strange, too. You know I didn't even bring my car and they're already trying to sell me a wash."

The comedian next expounded on South Vietnam's building boom. "First comes the boom and then the building," he joshed.

Miss Dune, decked out in a free-flowing yellow dress, sang and danced with Hope, as did Miss Welch. Both girls also performed solo numbers.

Miss World, Madeline Hartog Bel of Peru, performed a multi-lingual comedy skit with several members of the audience.

Barbara McNair, gliding across the stage in a slinky, floor length orange gown, drew low moans of approval from a crowd nearly hypnotized by her rendition of "I'm a Woman."

Supporting the Hope show, as he has for many years, was Les Brown and his orchestra.

The show ended, all too soon, with Miss Mc-Nair leading the 9th Division infantrymen in "Silent Night." ★

Mining of T-151-5 and A-132-3

On January 14, 1969 T-151-5 was sunk by a possible U.S. 750 pound bomb that was converted to a command detonated mine on the Rach Cai Nhut river in Chuong Thien Province. SN David Land and FN Jose Campos were KIA along with a Vietnamese Marine.

FN Terry Thompson and EN3 Richard L Keller were killed in action when ASPB 132-3 was sunk by an enemy mine of unknown type that was detonated beneath its stern during an April 29, 1969 operation on the Cai Tu River, which is also in Chuong Thien Province. A second ASPB, 132-1 was damaged as a result of the explosion. (This incident is described in the SEA LORDS section under Operations in Enemy Base Area 480.) As you can see, there was a lot of damage. ★

Reliables Overcoming Mekong Enemies

New tactic, increased mobility

Since December 1966. the 9th Division has faced enemies—the two Cong and the terrain.

The Division came to Vietnam to fight in the Delta, but many problems of movement there had never been documented. Hence, the Old Reliables were forced to use their own ingenuity in conquering the Delta.

Movement by foot is a struggle. The VC place booby traps on the rice paddy dikes to discourage movement along the only high ground available, so troops stick to the mud.

Wheeled vehicles must stay on the few existing roads. Traced vehicles, except the tanks and heavier retrievers, have found the Delta no real obstacle to travel. Armored Personnel Carriers (APC) have negotiated all types of terrain throughout the Delta. Occasionally, the banks of a stream are too steep to allow the APCs to cross. This problem has been solved many times by scraping the



bank down or finding another crossing place.

The Army has yet to build a tank that will float, so armor is restricted in movement

To facilitate movement in the watery Delta, U.S. military leaders formed the Mobile Riverine Force (MRF) by teaming maneuver and artillery units of the 9th Division with Naval

Task Force 117.

Using the hundreds of Mekong Delta waterways as highways, the combined MRF units have moved into the once isolated areas of Bien Hoa, Long An and Dinh Tuong Provinces.

With armored troop carriers (ATCs), ferrying 2d Brigade infantrymen into Viet Cong strongholds situated along the tree lined rivers, the VC hideouts are no longer impenetrable.

By positioning gunboats to prevent enemy escape by sampans, and maneuvering land elements into driving and blocking positions, the once Viet Cong controlled waterways are now being used to force the enemy from the fertile Delta lowlands.

> Helicopters play an important role in Vietnam, mainly because they can deliver fresh troops to a

combat area. This is an exhausting effort.

Troops are lifted from base areas and flown to landing zones in close proximity to enemy positions. Landing zones are usually nothing more than rice paddies. Often the choppers will hover over the spongy earth while troops leap into the mire below.

Helicopters assist in many other ways to beat the problem of unstable terrain. Big Chinooks lift the guns into areas that towed artillery would never reach. In fast-moving actions, the big CH-47s zip the guns across the flooded fields to new firing positions and always keep the guns within supporting range of the infantry.

Normally, the artillery must have firm ground to deliver effective fire. Because the Delta terrain is so unstable, two innovations have been developed to ensure the guns follow the troops.

The 2d Brigade units, operating as a part of the Mobile Riverine Force, have 105-mm howitzers mounted on barges that are towed along with the MRF. The second invention is a steel platform that can be carried by Chinook to a selected firing point and dropped into mud, water or a combination of both. The platform is leveled and the guns are flown in and placed on the elevated platforms.

With the ability to move by land, air and water, the 9th Division has gained greater flexibility than ever imagined. The ingenuity exhibited by Old Reliables in their fight against the terrain has contributed to continued success in the Mekong Delta. ★

214 Viet Cong Die in **Clash with 2nd Bde Units**

Ninth Infantry Division The Old Reliable May 6, 1967, Page 1

TAM—Units of the 2nd Bde clashed with a major Viet Cong force 10 miles northwest of here Tuesday in Binh Tuong Province killing 214 Body Count (BC) and capturing numerous VC weapons.

It was the largest battle to date fought in the Mekong Delta by Old Reliables based at Dong Tam.

Friendly losses were 15 killed and 27 wounded.

The battle erupted the early afternoon when the 3rd /47th Infantry and the 3rd/60th Infantry encountered an enemy force believed to be elements of the Viet Cong's 514th Provincial Mobile Battalion.


By mid-afternoon, elements of the 3rd/47th had established defensive blocking positions around the enemy while the 3rd/60th initiated a squeezing action.

The surrounded enemy was pounded with six air strikes, constant artillery barrages from the 3rd/34th Artillery, and withering fire from helicopter gunships.

Armored personal carriers from the 5th/60th Infantry were also called in to support the infantry troops.

A sweep of the battle area produced: a 30-caliber machine gun, an M-60 machine gun, four 60-mm mortars, one Browning automatic rifle, eight carbines, a 57-recoilless rifle, and one Thompson submachine gun.

BINH PHUOC—As most combat infantrymen can tell you, the weird and unusual events that take place on a mission or night patrol can rarely be matched.

Specialist Four Jimmy Johnson, 20, of Dallas, GA, had such an event occur while on a night ambush patrol with the 9th Division's 5th Mechanized Battalion, 60th Infantry. His squad set up their security and Johnson, along with the other men not on the first guard, went to sleep.

About 11 p.m. Johnson was aroused to a state of semiconsciousness by an unusual wiggling sensation on his leg. At first, he thought he was dreaming. A second quick jerky motion on his leg not only convinced him that he wasn't asleep, but sent him in a series of violent contortions. Squad members rushed over, thinking he was having some type of

What had taken place was that an 18-inch snake had crawled up his pant leg while he was asleep. Johnson quickly took hold of the snake from the outside of his pants and was trying to rip a hole in the seam when another squad member grabbed him and held him down thinking he was having a fit. Luckily Johnson was still able to rip a hole in the seam of his pants and throw the snake out.

"I guess he crawled in to get warm," Johnson said. "Whatever, it was one of the weirdest feelings in the world." *

5th-60th Platoon **Leader Proves** He's A Swinger

BINH PHUOC—"It's all over," said a 9th Infantry Division Lieutenant as he flew through the air, 60 feet above a river in Long An Province recently.

Second Lieutenant John R. Sweet, 23. a platoon leader of Company B, 5th Battalion (Mech) 60th Infantry was serenely riding on his APC on a road security mission when he suddenly went airborne.

As his platoon's lead track rumbled across a bridge, its antenna struck an overhanging 3 foot by 10 foot sign. Sweet, riding next to the driver in the second track, casually pushed the dangling sign aside as he passed.

What he didn't notice was that a hook on the end of the sign had attached itself firmly to the cuff of his fatigue pants.

The track continued on at 20 mph. Suddenly, the surprised platoon leader was gone. His startled driver quickly



ted him swinging across the center of the bridge.

Hanging upside down, he gracefully sailed between two iron girders and out over the river 50 feet below. "I opened my eyes when I was swinging over the water," said Sweet, "and decided it's all over."

On his return trip, Sweet brushed the two girders with his hands and stopped in the center of the bridge where the next track removed him from the hook.

"I hate to think what would have happened if my cuff had ripped," said Sweet. "It was the most frightening experience of my life."

Sweet's men, however, now consider him a real swinger. ★





U.S. Naval Support Activity Nha Be (1966-1972)

The U.S. naval establishment at Nha Be, 7 miles south of Saigon, was a major combat and logistic base during the Southeast Asian Conflict. As naval leaders concluded early, the site was strategically placed at the junction of the Long Tau and Soi Rap, the main rivers between the port of

Saigon and South the China Sea. In addition Nha Be lay astride waterways traversing the Viet Cong-infiltrated Rung

the eastern Mekong Delta region. To support river patrol and minesweeping operations, Nha Be was ideally located; in addition, the Vietnamese Navy's River Assault Group compound there initially was suitable for a small American force.

In March 1966 a detachment of Mine Squadron 11, employing 57-foot minesweeping boats (MSBs) and converted landing craft, became the first U.S. naval unit to deploy at Nha Be. During the next 5 years, the U.S. minesweeping force patrolled the water approaches to Saigon, escorted commercial and military vessels, and worked to keep the ship channels free of enemy mines. While vessels were damaged or sunk, the absolutely vital water line of communication never was severed by Viet Cong action.

Also in March 1966, the first units of the Navy's River Patrol Force tied up at Nha Be and soon afterward began operations against the Viet Cong waterborne logistic traffic in the Rung Sat and in the Mekong Delta. Eventually, the base was able to support 40 river patrol boats (PBRs) engaged in this operation, designated Game Warden. Other components of the force were Helicopter Support Squadron 1 and Helicopter Attack (Light) Squadron 3, detachments of which flew from helicopter pads at nearby Cruickshank Airfield. Both the surface and air units of the River Patrol Force based at Nha Be took part in operation Giant Slingshot, which sought to interdict communist men and supplies infiltrating from Cambodia on the Vam Co Dong and Vam Co Tay Rivers during 1969-71.

The support base at Nha Be developed into a major logistic complex. Initially, the river sailors had to rely on Army depots in Saigon for supply items common to both services and were quartered in tents at the Vietnamese installation. However once the Naval Support Activity Saigon Detachment Nha Be, was established, conditions

improved. A pier for the PBRs was fashioned with Army pontoons, YRBM-16 a large converted lighter, was stationed at the site, making berthing, repair, spare parts, and supplies available. An Army crane was used for hull repair of the MSBs. These and other measures were taken to pro-

vide interim support.

Meanwhile 20 acres of nearby swampland were filled with dredged soil, and by December 1966 work was begun on permanent

base facilities, which included depot-level repair, administrative, communications, storage, maintenance, quartering, and messing buildings, four 1,000-barrel fuel storage tanks, and a boat pier. Although securing potable water and shoring up the landfill presented problems, Nha Be became a key naval support complex in the Saigon area.

By late 1968, 84 craft and the recently deployed headquarters of Naval Support Activity Saigon were based there. The facility continued to serve the Navy's needs until its turnover to Vietnamese Navy and the disestablishment of Naval Support Activity, Saigon, Detachment Nha Be, in April 1972.**★**

2d Bde Kills 30 VC in Go Cong

ABOARD THE USS BENEWAH-Old Reliables of the 9th Division killed 31 Viet Cong in the northern Go Cong Province during a 3-day Riverine and air-mobile strike TAOR operation which ended Thursday.

The 2d Brigade troops detained 63 persons while combing the flat plains and lacework of rivers and canals of Go Cong.


The strike operation marked the first time Old Reliables have operated in the province.

After landing on beaches south of the Go Cong River in US Navy Armored Troop Carriers, the 3d and 4th Battalions of the 47th Infantry moved inland checking carefully for suspected enemy concentrations.

Many of the enemy killed died as they fought from spider holes along the waterways.

Seven other Hoi Chanh turned themselves into the infantry. Three Russian rifles and two US carbines were captured during the action.

At the conclusion of the operation, the Go Cong Province Chief presented the Mobile Riverine Force with a solid brass cannon given to his people by the Portuguese 250 years ago.★

330 VC Killed in 27 Days of Coronado V Operations

LONG THANH—The 9th Division's Operation CORONADO V, originating in the Cam Son Secret Zone of Dinh Tuong Province, moving into Kien Hoa Province and shifting to the Ban Long Secret Zone near Cam Son, accounted for 330 enemy killed.

The operation ended Oct. 8, following 27 days of combat and patrol missions in the watery low-lands of the Mekong Delta.

Soldiers of the Division's 2d Brigade, two battalions from the 3d Brigade, and units of the 7th Division, Army of the Republic of Vietnam (ARVN) saw the sharpest fighting of the operation when they searched the marshy Cam Son area during mid-September.

Infantry units, elements of U.S. Navy's Task Force 117, supporting artillery, helicopter gunships, and Air Force fighter-bombers killed 213 enemy soldiers during a 6-day period ended Sept. 16.

Major battles erupted as the 3rd Battalion, 47th Infantry; 3d Battalion, 60th Infantry; 5th Mechanized Battalion, 60th Infantry and the 2d Battalion, 60th Infantry clashed with the 263d Viet Cong Battalion along the Ba Rai River 50 miles southwest of Saigon.

Action flared up again Oct. 6 and 7 when a total of 94 enemy were killed during search and destroy missions in Dinh Tuong Province near the site of the mid-September battles.

Totals for the operation, which began Sept. 12, show 11 individual weapons captured, one crew-served weapon seized, and 11,200 rounds of small arms ammunition taken from enemy supply caches.


Demolitions teams destroyed 1,143 bunkers, 41 rounds of enemy mortar ammunition, 13 mines and 11 punji pits during the operation.

Five enemy rifles and two crewserved weapons were destroyed by artillery fire and air strikes that pounded enemy fortifications in support of Allied ground forces.

Thirty-five Americans, including six men serving with Naval Task Force 117, were killed during Operation CORONADO V. ★

Commander "Ierry" Hynes, a graduate of the US Naval Academy, was an Advisor for the SVN Navy's newly organized Operation Junk Force. The Coastal Junk Force patrolled the coast from Phu Quoc Island to the DMZ. Jerry told me they wanted him to stand on the bow of his two diesel junk in tropical whites. His brother lim showed me his DD 214 after his death and he was wounded while patrolling the 1½ mile area between Phu Ouoc Island and Cambodia. It ended his naval career. Despite his DD 214, Jerry was wounded at two different times. Retired, he loved to party with his biker friends who visited him at his home. May the Commander rest in peace.

Commander "Jerry" Hynes was the father of the Southern Junk Force.

Our own GMGCM (MDV) Ret Chet "Gunner" Stanley was also a member of the Early Junk Force.

A Brief History Of Junk Force (Excerpt from Vietnam River Warfare 1945-1975, by Lt Col Victor Croizat)

When the South Vietnamese Navy took on the task of patrolling the coast in 1956, it soon realizes that it had neither the personnel nor the material resources to perform satisfactorily. Accordingly, it proposed to the U.S. mission in Saigon the organization of a force of junks to conduct inshore patrols in sensitive areas. The idea was that junks manned by

The idea was that junks manned by

South Vietnamese Command Junk

locally recruited civilians, trained by the Navy and working in coordination with the national police could easily mingle with local boat traffic to observe and report on maritime activity in designated key locations. This proposal was eventually adopted in 1960 and by 1961 there were 80 sailing junks operating off the coast of the I Corps area below the 17th parallel.

In 1962 the U.S. mission proposed an expansion of the Junk Force to include 84 command junks, 100 motor-sail junks, 140 motor junks, and 320 sail junks. Plans were also made to establish five coastal repair facilities and assign responsibility for the defense of force bases to the Regional Forces. The plans were implemented in 1963. Then, in 1964, when relative ineffectiveness of the sail junk had been demonstrated, the U.S.—Japanese designed Yabuta was introduced as a replacement.

At the time the Americans organized their coastal surveillance for 'Market Time,' the Junk Force was integrated into the Vietnamese Navy as the Coastal Force. When on July 1, 1965, this new designation became effective, the Coastal Force numbered 4,000 personnel and had 389 motor junks and 95 sail junk organized into 28 groups based at 22 locations. While the force was to grow to include over 600 junks, it remained plagued by shortages of personnel and supplies. The Vietnamese Navy supply organization was centered in Saigon

and was ill-equipped to support an organization as widely dispersed as the Coastal Force. This dispersion, moreover, made the bases particularly vulnerable to the Viet Cong attack. The problem of base defense was yet another difficulty that was never satisfactorily resolved.

Typical coastal groups of the 1965-66 period operating in the north generally consisted of three command junks and 16 sail junks (gradually replaced by Yabutas). In the south, the typical group had three command junks six motor-sail junks. This organization varied from group to group and changed as additional boats entered the inventory. Such variation also found in various types of junks used. These other than for the Yabutas, were locally manufactured and varied accordingly. In general, the five types of junks used by Vietnamese Navy Coastal Force had characteristics as follows:

• Command Junk length 17 m, beam 5 m; armament: one each .30 and .50 caliber machine-guns, plus crew weapon.

• Motor-Sail Junk length 13 m, beam 3.7 m; armament: crew weapon only.

• Motor Junk length 11.5 m, beam 2.6 m; armament: crew weapon only.

• Sail Junk length 9.7 m, beam 2 m; armament: crew weapon only.

• Yabuta Junk length 16.9 m, beam 3.4 m; armament: one each .30 and .50 caliber machine-guns and one 60-mm mortar plus crew weapon. ★



2d-60th Empties Enemy Arsenal

Ninth Infantry Division The Old Reliable July 19, 1967, Page 1

AN NHUT TAN—An enemy arsenal of carefully oiled rifles, automatic weapons, ammunition, mines and even a mortar was uncovered near here last week by a 19-man brush-clearing detail of 9th Division soldiers.

The well-constructed underground metal bin also yielded an obsolete combat radio and a badly damaged M-16 rifle.

The detail, from Company A in the 3d Brigade's 2d Battalion, 60th Infantry stumbled upon the arsenal not more than 150 yards from the perimeter that protects this Mekong Delta village.

Staff Sergeant Edwin D. Kirk of Utica, KY, had led the soldiers into an area just north of the village proper shortly after noon chow. They had been chopping away at the dense foliage along Vam Co Dong River for less than an hour when the discovery was made.

Kirk was checking progress when he noticed the corner of a plank in the grass and palm fronds his men had cut down to clear a field of fire.

"At first I thought it was part of an old grave or something," he recounted.

"But when I moved one of the planks aside, I saw a heavy-gauge metal sheet about 10 feet long and 5 or so feet wide. There was a rectangular hole cut in the center," he said.

The metal was the top of a well-concealed bin set $2\frac{1}{2}$ feet into the ground.

"We started pulling up the weapons," continued Kirk.

The bin yielded 22 rifles, including US and foreign-made carbines and semiautomatic weapons; seven submachine guns of various types, a machine gun of East German manufacture, ten 20-pound shape charge "turtle" mines complete with the electrically detonated blasting caps, a 60 millimeter mortar, a PRC-10 combat radio of the type formerly used by American ground troops, and a large quantity of ammunition.

"The weapons were well-lubricated and oily rags had been stuffed into their barrels," Kirk said.

The M-16 rifle had been struck by a bullet destroying its firing mechanism, according to Kirk.

The weapons were placed upon ammunition boxes to prevent damage from water that had collected in the bottom of the metal bin.

"We hauled up two 5-gallon oil buckets filed with .50 caliber ammo," said Kirk, "and seven boxes full of small arms ammo."

"The mortar was complete except for the sighting device," he said. "But it could have been aimed without the sight," he added.

The radio lacked only its headset, battery and calibrating knob.

Both the mortar tube and the German machine gun were wrapped in portions of a poncho for further protection.

Troops of rotating companies of the battalion have several times swept the area where the arsenal was uncovered, but had turned up only grenade-type booby traps.

The village, on the banks of the Vam Co Dong River, about 20 miles southwest of Saigon in Long An Province has been occupied by elements of the 2d/60th since March.

Before then, it had been a long-time Viet Cong stronghold. ★
