



Dear Shannon,

My husband, John, and I had the privilege of attending the Mobile Riverine Force Association reunion in St. Louis, where you and your husband introduced your remarkable film. John served on Patrol Boat T112-2 in Vietnam from 1968 to 1969, and this was our first reunion. He has rarely been around other veterans and never speaks about his wartime experiences, so I was unsure how he would feel at the event.

As the lights dimmed and your movie began, the ballroom fell silent for two hours—you could have heard a pin drop. When the lights came up, I wiped tears streaming down my face and noticed that every proud Vietnam veteran in the room was either hugging a fellow veteran or wiping away their own tears. John remained quiet until Paul Erasmus, who appeared in your film, embraced him. That moment unleashed a flood of emotions for John.

Your film was extraordinary, and Mike Rowe's narration was perfect. Thank you for dedicating the time and effort to create this deeply meaningful work, clearly a labor of love. The stories of these brave men and women, who were often met with hate instead of a hero's welcome upon returning home, deserve to be preserved. Without films like yours, their history risks being lost once the last Vietnam veteran passes.

John and I hope you will consider making another film, as there is so much more to their story. We purchased a copy of your film to share with our adult grandsons, hoping they will understand the sacrifices made by these courageous teenagers who proudly served their country, even when their country didn't always appreciate them. Quilts of Vallor

The Quilts of Valor Foundation (QOVF) was founded in 2003 by Catherine Roberts, a Blue Star Mom. Her son's year-long deployment to Iraq provided the initial inspiration, and her desire to ensure that returning warriors were welcomed home with the love and gratitude they deserved provided the rest.

She felt that uniting quilters in a national effort could achieve her goal of covering all service members and veterans touched by war. These quilts, called Quilts of Valor, serve as a tangible reminder of an American's appreciation and gratitude. This grassroots effort quickly spread across the United States and today includes thousands of quilters from all 50 states.

Quilts of Valor are stitched with love, prayers, and healing thoughts. Service members and veterans who have been touched by war receive these tangible awards of gratitude that unequivocally say, "Thank you for your service, sacrifice, and valor."

The QOVF first connected with the MRFA through John "Rowdy" Oxley, a member of the QOVF Board of Directors. Our first MRFA group awards took place in Las Vegas, Nevada, where we presented 42 quilts. Following that reunion, 17 additional veterans requested and received Quilts of Valor. We then awarded nine quilts at the 2023 MRFA reunion in St. Louis. At the 2025 MRFA reunion, we presented five quilts on Friday morning in a private ceremony and 11 at the Hero's Banquet on Saturday evening. We received an additional 30 requests that Saturday evening. To date, we have received 376 requests and awarded 248 quilts.

Tribute to Albert Moore, by his stepson, Rich Otteson

It's challenging to put a person's life into a few words; however, I hope this captures the essence.

Albert was a deeply private man who never wanted attention or praise — but behind the scenes, he made a quiet impact by constantly helping others. I'd like to share three themes that I believe best reflect the man I knew and loved:

Leadership and Service. In the military, leadership often follows a strict chain of command. Orders are given and followed — not necessarily questioned. This top-down structure is essential for national security and discipline. But leadership isn't always about authority. Albert embodied a different kind of leadership — Servant Leadership where the goal isn't power, but service. He focused on lifting others up, helping them grow, and putting their needs first. One of my favorite sayings is: "It's amazing what a team can do when nobody cares who gets the credit." That was Albert in a nutshell. He rarely took credit for anything, but his efforts were always at the heart of the mission. As a Navy cook during the Vietnam War, he fed the crew — a simple but essential act of service that reflects his character. Even later in life, Albert always had a kind word, a listening ear, and a helping

Camaraderie and Passion. Though Albert was reserved, he held great passion for the causes and people he cared about. As President of the MRFA, he had every opportunity to stand in the spotlight — but he chose instead to stand behind the scenes, working tirelessly to support the group's success. He was the planner, the steady hand, the quiet force keeping everything moving. Though Albert was reserved, he held great passion for the causes and people he cared about. One of his fellow MRFA members said it best:

hand. Serving others wasn't something

he did — it was who he was.

"Albert was hands down one of the finest men I've ever had the good fortune and privilege to meet and call a friend. He was a true gentleman and tremendous patriot with a great sense of humor, a ready smile, passionate about whatever the cause, and a kind word for everyone he ever met. He was the founding heart of the MRFA and as the salt water and brown water sailor he was, I wish him fair winds and following seas — and ask him to keep the hatch door ajar for the rest of his shipmates as we all take our turn to follow."
